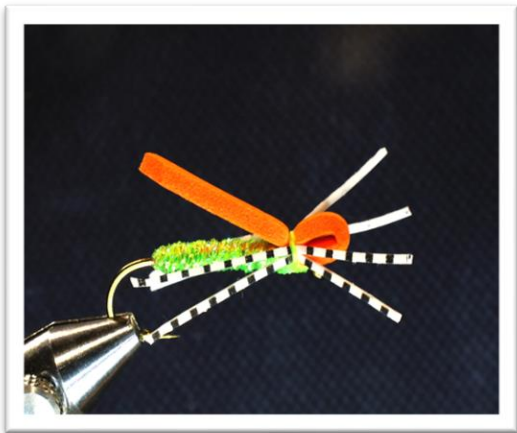


The Falmouth Jitter Bug

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Hook, Size 12-8 streamer 2xl

Thread Chartreuse or Orange fluorescent. (uv)

Orange foam

Chartreuse crystal braid small

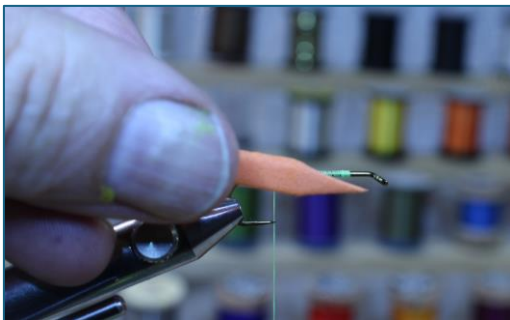
Legs, White barred silly legs



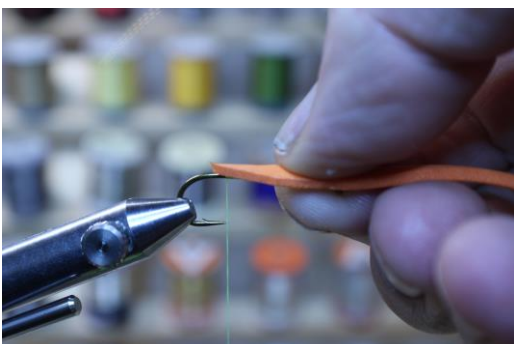
Start the thread 1/3 back from the hook eye



**Wrap the thread to the point of the hook.
And trim off the tag end**



**Trim The foam into 1/8th in strips.
Then on one end cut a long, tapered point**



**Catch the foam strip by the point just above the
hook point. Remember not to pull on the thread
too hard or you may cut the foam with the thread**

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Use wide holding wraps to tie in the foam up to the starting point of the thread. Return the thread to the hook point position



Tie in a 3 in piece of the Crystal braid. You will want the Braid On the top of the hook. Use a section that will let you tie it in all the way the end of the body section.



Wrap The braid In with tight, touching wraps. This will compress the foam and lock it in place

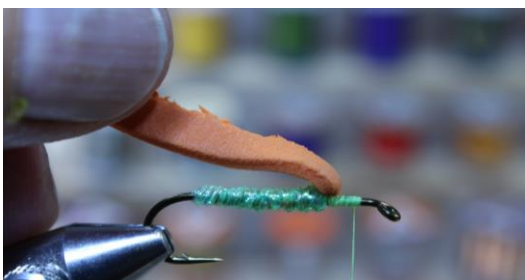


Lock the braid in with the thread.

Note: I have Moved the foam so you can see this step



Trim off the excess braid



Wrap the thread forward in front of the foam. This will start the head. And create a tie in point for the next step

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Fold the foam over about 1 1/2 hook eyes PAST the hook eye. Use 2 or three Holding wraps To secure the foam.

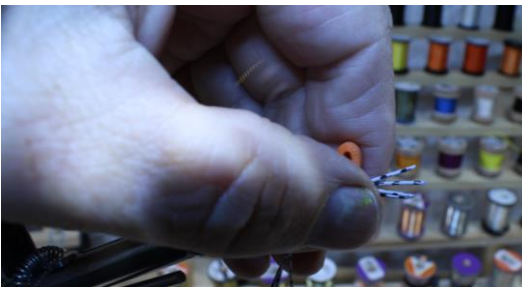
Do not pull it down tight or you will cut the foam.



Double over one strand of the silly legs. Then align the Two ends at the end of the hook on the far side. Allow the weight of the bobbin Hold the legs in place. They should fall in the space just under the Foam fold.



Fold the lega around the front of the fly. They should be slightly shorter than the rear legs. Then catch them in with 2 wraps of the thread. Then adjust the legs so they Fall Into the fold of the Foam. Once secure create a whip finish head. Cut the thread.



Hold the front loop and trim the legs straight across. They should be about a hook gap past the eye of the hook.



The rear legs get trimmed strait across at the end of the hook.



Trim the wing of the bug into a long taper. It should align with the end of the legs.

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Top, Bottom and Side view of the finished fly.

I use this fly for many different applications. This is a great top water fly for any fish during terrestrial season.

This is also a great attractor fly for a dry dropper. As an indicator fly you can't beat this color combination.

I have caught everything from trout to bass to sunfish on this fly. You can use different color combinations, but I find this one is the most productive
